#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION:**

This writing course will use the IEW (Institute for Excellence in Writing) text, Wonders of Science Writing Lessons. Throughout the course of the year, students will progress from writing Key Word Outlines (KWO) and simple paragraphs to short essays and creative writing assignments. Part of the class will focus on how and why to revise our writing, as well as look at the process of illustrating what we write. We will engage in a wide variety of writing throughout the course of the year – from non-fiction descriptions of fascinating animals, to creative writing of fairy tales and myths with a science theme, to reports on famous scientists. Students will need to take notes during class, either copying the KWO we create together or working to create their own in small groups. They will be expected to participate in discussions and classroom games as well.

Parental involvement is necessary at this age to help with the writing process. Students will need to spend from 2-3 hours a week on writing, revising or illustrating their work. Parents are asked to read their email to understand the assignments and help their children keep up with the work. Students will have weekly assignments.

#### **HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS:**

Students will complete weekly writing, revising and/or illustrating assignments. They are expected to participate in class discussions and activities. They will need to submit typed papers as final drafts.

#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

This course will teach basic writing and editing skills. Topics covered will include argumentative, persuasive, expository, informational, compare/contrast, personal narrative, and humorous essays. The class will include foundational instruction on brainstorming, proper construction of sentences and paragraphs, editing, compiling a works cited page, and MLA formatting. We will also read four books which will serve as the basis of several of the writing assignments. This is a graded course. Books being considered are *Johnny Tremain, Macbeth, The Scarlet Pimpernel*, and *Mrs. Frisbee and the Rats of NIMH*.

#### **HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS**

- The course requires intensive time each week dedicated to writing and editing. Students
  will be expected to submit weekly written assignments and to complete all homework
  projects by the due date.
- Attendance will be a significant part of the student's grade. It is crucial that the student come to class having completed the homework assignments thoroughly and thoughtfully.
- Parents must commit to being heavily involved in helping their student complete and edit each assignment and to help their child meet the class deadlines.

#### **REQUIRED TEXTS AND SUPPLIES**

• I would like to purchase the same edition of the books we will read for each student so the class will be, literally, on the same page. In addition to the texts, the student will need a notebook or 3-ring binder, access to email and to Microsoft Word, and the ability to print their homework assignments.

#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

This fast-paced course will explore American literature along with the cultural and historical events and ideas that influenced each work. All content will be discussed from a Biblical worldview. Classical novels include but are not limited to Lord of the Flies, Co.Aytch, The Great Gatsby, Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass, The Scarlet Letter, To Kill a Mockingbird, Fahrenheit 451, 1984, and Frankenstein.

The course will focus on the three strands of study: Analyze, Read, and Evaluate. Topics include identifying theme, character analysis, setting, tone, protagonist, anti-hero, cultural context, identifying propaganda, irony, inference, and more.

Grading will be determined by student preparedness, effort, respectfulness, informed participation in class, in addition to timely submission of weekly homework, quizzes, and tests. Students will participate in study groups. Other coursework includes movie viewing, two papers, a project, and one oral presentation.

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course gives the foundation for success in Algebra 1. All topics are introductory in nature. Topics will include operations with integers, understanding variables and solving equations, rational numbers, ratio & proportion, percent, measurement & metric systems, graphs and exponents, and polynomials. Class time will entail reviewing homework, taking quizzes and discussing them, and introducing the next topic. Emphasis will be placed on learning through practicing problems with the instructor, with other students, and independently at home.

#### **REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS:**

The student is expected to complete all assigned work (homework, tests, quizzes, and videos) BEFORE the next class and with all work shown and completed neatly. Although some problems may be difficult, the student is expected to attempt all problems to the best of their ability. Math is best learned by doing, making mistakes, and then correcting those mistakes.

#### **REQUIREMENTS FOR PARENTS:**

Parents are to come alongside and help each student complete assignments to the best of their ability and on time for the subsequent class period. Parents are expected to proctor tests and quizzes and ensure they are returned before the next class.

The student will receive credit for homework completed, tests, and quizzes.

#### **MATHEMATICS – ALGEBRA 1 – GRADE 8-12**

#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

This high school level math course covers a complete year of Algebra. Topics will include order of operations, functions, polynomials, factoring, radicals, and the quadratic formula. Class time will be spent going over weekly homework, introducing the next week's concepts, and answering questions from the students.

#### **REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS:**

Students, you will be expected to spend four to six hours a week, outside of class, reading and working problems in the text. You will be expected to complete either four or five lessons or a test each week for a total of 4 or 5 days of work outside of class (depending on the week). You will need to stay on the schedule of the class, take tests at home, and turn in your tests as scheduled. No separate midterm or final is planned.

#### **REQUIREMENTS FOR PARENTS:**

Parents, you will be expected to ensure that your students are staying on schedule and their work is corrected. The students MUST show their work as they complete their homework assignments. In addition, parents must be willing to administer, proctor, and check the chapter quizzes then have their student correct all wrong answers on each quiz. Parents will be expected to administer and proctor the chapter tests at home, but the teacher will grade the tests. This class moves at a somewhat rapid pace, and it is imperative that all students keep up with the schedule.

#### **GRADING AND TESTS:**

The students will get credit for completing their homework on-time, correcting it, writing out definitions and/or formulas as assigned, and for their quizzes and test grades.

#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

This high school level math course covers a complete year of Algebra 2. A thorough treatment of advanced algebraic concepts will be provided through the study and graphing of functions, equations, inequalities, systems of equations, polynomials, rational and radical equations, complex numbers, and sequences and series. Students will build a strong connection between algebraic and graphic representations of functions.

Class time will be spent introducing the next week's concepts, note-taking, homework review, and preparation for quizzes, tests, and end of the semester finals.

#### **STUDENT REQUIREMENTS**

Pre-requisite: Successful completion of Algebra 1. It is strongly recommended that Geometry is taken before Algebra 2.

Students, you will be expected to spend four to six hours a week, outside of class, reading and working problems in the text. You will be expected to complete four lessons or a test each week for a total of 4 days of work outside of class. You will need to stay on the schedule of the class, take tests at home and turn in your tests as scheduled. A midterm and final will be given.

#### **PARENT REQUIREMENTS**

Parents, you will be expected to ensure that your students are staying on schedule and their work is corrected. The students MUST show their work as they complete their assignments and take the tests. This class moves at a somewhat rapid pace, and it is imperative that all students keep up with the schedule. Tests will be administered at home and graded by the teacher. You will need to ensure your student brings his/her completed test to class.

This high school level math course covers a complete year of Precalculus. It presents a balanced study of the foundations of calculus and practical real-world applications. Students will review key families of functions before studying trigonometry and its applications. The study of matrices, analytic geometry, sequences and series complete the foundation for higher math courses. Concluding chapters introduce descriptive and inferential statistics and differential and integral calculus. Special features present biblical perspectives of mathematics and its history. Class time will be spent introducing the next week's concepts, note-taking, homework review, and preparation for quizzes, tests, and end of the semester finals.

#### **STUDENT REQUIREMENTS**

Pre-requisite: Successful completion of Algebra 2 and Geometry.

Students, you will be expected to spend four to six hours a week, outside of class, reading and working problems in the text. You will be expected to complete four lessons or a test each week for a total of 4 days of work outside of class. You will need to stay on the schedule of the class, take tests at home and turn in your tests as scheduled. A midterm and final will be given.

#### **PARENT REQUIREMENTS**

Parents, you will be expected to ensure that your students are staying on schedule and their work is corrected. The students MUST show their work as they complete their assignments and take the tests. This class moves at a somewhat rapid pace, and it is imperative that all students keep up with the schedule. #### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

In this course, we will be using the Apologia curriculum to give students an introduction to the incredible human body. Students will do a deep-dive into the unique design of their own body–both inside and out. The *Exploring Creation with Human Anatomy and Physiology* course takes both an academic and practical approach to best teach your student about the human body. As they engage with the lessons, projects, and experiments, we hope your student will grow to better understand the complexity and purposes of the human body's design.

This course begins with a brief history of medicine and then gives your student a peek into cells and DNA. Using vivid graphics and hands-on activities to make learning come to life, your student will also explore the various body systems, nutrition and health, how God designed their immune system to protect them, and what makes them a unique creation of God.

As we work through the course, your student will enjoy many hands-on experiments and projects which we hope will help bring excitement, contemplation, exploration and wonder as the students gain a new understanding of God's amazing creation, the human body.

No grade will be given; however, students are expected to do their homework each week to the best of their ability. Further, students are expected to come each week having read the assigned pages in the text and having completed any assigned notebook pages and to enter each class prepared, ready to listen, follow directions, and develop an appreciation and basic knowledge of human anatomy. Parents are expected to assist the student in completing weekly readings and assignments.

#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION:**

We will be using the Good and the Beautiful curriculum to study the human body. In the first half of the year we will study the different systems of the body (digestive, renal circulatory, respiratory, skeletal). We will cover a brief section of hygiene and a healthy lifestyle. The second half of the year will cover the nervous system, the brain, and the senses. We will discuss emotional, mental, and social health.

The goal of this class is to introduce students to the human body and do an overview of each system and its anatomy. There will be some hands-on activities with each lesson. The human body is fascinating, and I would like kids to be inspired by God's amazing design of our bodies while at the same time equipping them to understand their bodies and the responsibility and choices they have to care for their bodies. #### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

• This year we will use the newly updated 3<sup>rd</sup> edition of the Apologia Physical Science textbook. This is a new textbook edition, and the content has been updated and expanded to include more physical science topics. This year we will cover atomic structure, the periodic table, chemical bonds, reactions and energy, motion, forces, energy, waves and sound, light, electricity and magnetism, and Earth's structure, weathering, and atmosphere.

• Class time will include lectures, practice problems, and lab activities.

#### **PRE-REQUISITES**

Prealgebra or confidence in arithmetic, an ability to work independently, write reasonably confidently, and a willingness to learn.

#### **HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS**

Weekly homework assignments include reading the text, solving problems, writing lab reports, and taking tests. I will record grades and provide semester grade reports to parents based on homework, lab reports, and tests.

# **NATURAL SCIENCE - BIOLOGY - GRADE 9-12**

TIME: Thursdays 1:00-2:00 (lecture), Tuesdays 1:00-2:30 (lab)

CLASS MIN/MAX: 3/12

HOMEWORK HOURS: 4-6 hours per week

CLASSROOM HELPERS: 1

#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

This course will consist of both lab instruction (most Tuesdays) and a review of the chapter being covered (Thursdays). Using the text Science Shepherd Biology, we will approach biology with a micro to macro approach beginning with basic biochemistry, cellular biology and genetics. Afterwards we will learn about organisms from the 5 kingdoms and end with human anatomy and physiology.

#### **HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS**

Plan on 4-6 hours each week. There may be some supplemental reading to cover certain topics in more detail. Each student will participate in the Year End Event by creating a display board related to a topic of specific interest to the student related to our study of Biology. Four formal lab reports are required. Tests are taken (closed book) by the student at home after every 2-3 chapters, approximately every 2-3 weeks. Parents will be expected to proctor these tests at home.

#### **GRADES**

A recommended grade will be provided for the course based on student test scores, lab book, lab report grades and class participation.

#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

This college-preparatory laboratory-based chemistry course will provide a firm foundation in the basic laws and theories of modern chemistry. Topics include measurements and units, the Periodic Table of the Elements, Dalton's atomic theory, Lewis structures, stoichiometry, acid/base reactions, thermodynamics and kinetics. During class time we will perform experiments, analyze results, and solve mathematical problems introduced in chemistry. Students will be expected to maintain a laboratory notebook.

#### **PRE-REQUISITES**

Students should have completed Algebra I or will need permission of the teacher to take this class. Students will be expected to keep up with the volume of work; those who fall seriously behind may be asked to complete the class on their own because they will be unable to participate adequately in class activities and labs. Chemistry is a challenging science, and students will need to humbly ask for help if they are struggling. Parents and students will need email access to communicate with teacher.

#### **HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS**

There will be weekly homework assignments, which will include reading from the text, memorizing vocabulary words, doing calculations, and/or other activities to help students learn the material. Students will be expected to complete assigned homework, tests and/or lab write-ups each week; estimated time per week for students is 4 to 6 hours. A "Science Fair" project will be required and displayed at the Year End Event.

**Tests:** Tests will be provided by the teacher and should be taken by the student at home. Parents will be expected to proctor tests; the teacher will grade them. Tests will be reviewed in class after they are completed. A two-hour midterm and final exam will be scheduled outside of class time in January and May.

**Grades:** We will record grades and provide semester grade reports to parents based on tests, lab reports, homework, and midterm and final exam scores.

#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

I am excited to be sharing my professional graphic design knowledge with students who are eager to learn and who want to work hard and collaboratively. #### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

This is a course for students who wish to take the CLEP Spanish examination for college credit. The CLEP Spanish Language examination is designed to measure knowledge and ability equivalent to that of students who have completed two to three semesters of college Spanish language study; therefore, this class will be taught in Spanish. The course is designed to prepare the student to take the CLEP examination which contains approximately 121 questions to be answered in approximately 90 minutes. There are two listening sections (40%) and one reading section (60%). The two listening sections together are approximately 30 minutes in length and the reading section is 60 minutes in length. This course will focus primarily in reading comprehension, grammar, and vocabulary along with listening exercises. Students are required to be able to read on their own. Instruction will include study and test taking strategies applicable to the test.

## **PRE-REQUISITES**

Successful completion of Spanish 3 (may require teacher assessment).

## **HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS**

## Summary of course:

**FRENCH 3:** This year goes at a lot slower pace as we focus more on pronunciation, fluency and fluidity of speaking the language. We will be finishing the BJU book, reading works of literature, and I may add units of my own to round out their knowledge base. The structure of the course is basically the same as French 2, however there are more oral presentations that will require attention to pronunciation and memorization.

#### **Prerequisites:**

<u>Grades /homework guidelines/ Tests</u>: As always, a <u>parent</u> must notify me via email a minimum of 2 weeks before his student's planned absence so that I can have any materials he might need prepared early enough and so that I have enough time to record the class that day for your student. Grades and homework guidelines are the same as for French 2, and "Closed book", tests will be handed out to the student to take home at the end of each chapter about every 3 -4 weeks.

Missionary Country Board - Midterm (French 3): This year, students will be communicating either in French or English with a missionary in a Francophone country so that they can then present information on the culture, struggles, living situation, and more, to the students in our French 3 class. Then for their project board, they will be showcasing that country and giving information on the missionary with whom they have been corresponding. Students need to find their own missionary using their own resources (sometimes I have a missionary contact a former student has used) in any of the 40 countries where French is actively spoken, but each student must have a different country represented (first come-first served) The board will be due in January and might also be displayed at the Year End Event. Parents are encouraged to attend to support their student's work!

<u>Final Exam</u>: Thursday, May 16, 2024, 10:00am - 3pm. Please put this date on your calendar (date is non-negotiable and there is no make-up permitted unless bone fide illness)

**National French Exam:** Students will take the *Grand Concours* (National French Exam) in class as we did this past year and will need the same equipment: laptop with latest version of Chrome, earbuds, and charge cord – just in case! The cost is usually \$10.

PREREQUISITES: Completion of **my** BJU French 3 or permission from instructor

#### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

This French course will be conducted totally in French and will be conversation, movie, and French culture and literature based. A variety of material will be covered to possibly help students be prepared to take the SAT or AP exams, <u>but I strongly recommend that student and parent discuss their thoughts</u> with me about which exam to take BEFORE signing up for any of them! <u>PLEASE read Prospectus for French 4 below for more important info!!</u>

## **HOMEWORK REQUIREMENTS**

Students will be expected to <u>spread their homework out over the week</u> and to not wait to do it until the day before class! They will also be expected to listen to videos and audio emissions assigned to further work on their comprehension and communication skills, and to arrive completely prepared for class.

#### **REQUIRED MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES**

Students must have a laptop to bring to class, plus occasionally some headphones, and will also need a binder, pencils etc. I will provide most texts needed, however there will be a few extra books to purchase and at times students might need a thumb drive as well. **Students must be able to print a lot of research/ reading material, therefore access to a <u>reliable</u> printer with enough ink is necessary!** 

#### IMPORTANT THINGS YOU'LL WANT TO KNOW:

- YOU ARE NOT REGISTERED FOR THIS CLASS UNTIL I RECEIVE THE COMPLETED, EMAILED PARENT/STUDENT FORM FOR YOUR STUDENT (see prospectus below for specifics)
- Students will have about 10 hours of summer work to complete in August before classes start in September.
- We will watch many French movies of classic literature or that depict French culture. MUCH
  care has been taken to ensure these movies are as appropriate as possible. See prospectus
  for more info! Plus several classes will begin at 12:30pm on movie days so that we can finish
  the movie in 1 day and students may bring their lunch to class that day (no heating/ messy
  foods please)
- FINAL EXAM / Fête Française: This class has <u>NO FINAL EXAM</u>, but I expect students to attend the exam (to proctor French 3) and also the party at RGC on Thursday, May 16, 2024 PLEASE MARK YOUR CALENDAR NOW.

**Personal information:** as I said last year: I will be commuting an hour+, 2 times a week to RGC for my classes (If inclement weather or some weird circumstances keep me home, I will Zoom class. I DO NOT like Zooming my classes so it will not be often!)

**Expectations:** Students will come to class having completed all homework assignments and having brought all required materials. **Students will also speak only French to each other in class!** 

**Differences between my French 1-3 honors classes and French 4 advanced:** We will speak **TOTALLY IN FRENCH.** Note that these materials /assignments are **no longer required in French 4 ⊕:** 

- NO sign off sheets/ Quizlet/ Lingt
- NO daily homework tasks (<u>much less</u> hw than previous classes... about 1 hr a week except possibly when occasional papers are due- **depends on the student and procrastination**)
- No tri-fold board project
- No textbook/ activity manual etc.
- No final exam or midterm (they will have a final project instead but I DO ask my FR 4 students to be final exam proctors and to attend the party ③)

#### Students WILL be learning:

- How to communicate better in French verbally and in writing
- French culture in several areas including social, technological, art, etc.,
- To improve their ability to write correctly and fluidly,
- To research topics in French and then condense their findings to communicate concisely and fluently about their topic,

## **Required materials:** We will be reading a few books this year including:

- An abridged version of *Le Conte de Monte Cristo*
- Select stories from *Contes français*.
- Le Petit Prince
- More books TBD

For the 3 definite books listed above, I'm 95% sure that I have enough copies for each student (**SO DO NOT BUY THEM!**) But **for the TBD books**, there will be a slight cost when I finally purchase them for you since I'm adding them to the curriculum this year (I will try to find used copies).

Reminder: No final grades will be released to a student who has any of my personal materials outstanding. All my materials will be collected on final exam/party day.

#### Additional materials needed:

- Access to Internet for research.
- PRINTER with well-stocked ink for printing research and other materials.
- Ability to send occasional homework assignments to me via scanning. <u>Both parents and</u>
   students must use a free Adobe app for scanning back any kind of homework! (or have a high definition quality scanner)
- An **unabridged** French dictionary **OR dedication** to spend time at co-op with mine!
- MANY mechanical pencils and a 2"-3" loose-leaf binder w/ pockets, dividers and loose paper.
- I strongly suggest a three-hole punch that fits flat in the binder!

**Movies:** The movies we watch will be in French, but most will be with English subtitles ③. Please keep in mind that there are no movie rating guidelines in France/ Europe and although each movie has been screened individually by me (and others throughout the years), they will not be "squeaky clean, and some will have more mature vocabulary and themes. If you have any concerns, please contact me.

**Special movie event:** Every year my French 4 students come to my home for an EIGHT HOUR movie event to watch a French mini-series of the book *Le Conte de Monte Cristo* which includes enjoying fondue and other cultural fun. Since I now live so far away, my thoughts are to do this over a two-day period **at my home**, either **immediately after Co-op on Thursday and leave dinner time on Friday, OR** to begin **Friday 1pm until dinner on Saturday**. I will need one parent (or two at the most) to attend this fun weekend where we will indulge in authentic French/ Belgian foods etc. **PLEASE let me know on the parent/ student agreement which pairs of dates I have suggested might work for your student!!** 

**Grades / Tests or Quizzes/ Absences**: Students will have short tests or quizzes on some of their reading materials. For those assessments sent home, parents will need to proctor and sign **across the seal of the envelope** as usual. **If your student is a senior,** indicate that clearly on the Parent/Student agreement form so that I will have 1<sup>st</sup> semester grades done in time for college consideration. My simple grading scale has not changed: 0-69F, 70-79C, 89-89B, 90-99A, and I never curve.

As always, a <u>parent</u> must notify me <u>via email</u> <u>a minimum</u> of 2 weeks before her student's planned absence so that I can have any materials s/he might need prepared early enough and so that I have enough time to record the class that day for your student.

**Final Exam/ fête français:** Thursday, May 16, 2024, 10:00am-3pm. Please put this date on your calendar so that your students will be able to help Mrs. O'Brien with the fête or could help proctor the final for French 3.

**National French Exam:** Students will take the *Grand Concours* (National French Exam) in class as we did this past year and will need the same equipment: laptop with latest version of Chrome, earbuds, and charge cord – just in case! The cost is usually \$10.

**FYI for those who have attended FR 1 through my French 4 advanced class:** By the end of this class, students will have covered most colleges' first and second college level French **literature/ conversation** material and strong students who **have also focused on immersion** usually score above average on AP exams, SAT 2 exams, CLEP exams, etc. In college, their accents and grammar knowledge are frequently much better than their peers' and they are regularly offered jobs as tutors for the French department (after the French professor hears and sees their abilities). Although they will often be placed in a 300-level class (this is based on feedback from former students.), I always recommend that students take the level of French that is **one level below placement** so that they can get used to college/adult vocabulary and pace.

Regardless, it is worth each student's while to at least minor in French in college if they've taken this class because not only are they WAY ahead of their classmates, but they could even choose to study abroad in Paris or Brussels. The benefits of studying abroad (even for a 1 or 3 month stay/class) would include: expanding their fluency, gaining cultural advantages, and of course increasing many other invaluable life experiences, not to mention the rich mission ministry opportunities they would have!

Please call me throughout the year if there are any issues you feel a need to bring up with me. I feel very blessed and excited to be teaching your student again!
